thedral have been consistent rivals, as well as Mt. Carmel High School being a constant threat to the CIF Championship.




#### **Boys Lacrosse:**




Country day conflict. Obviously, competitive sports are taking a toll on the lives of many young students.

Full-court Press - When defenders guard the offense in the backcourt. Power Lay-up Shot - A layup used when closely guarded. Rocker Step - An offensive move consisting of a jab step followed by a step backward; the player can either shoot or drive, depending on the movement of the defender. Top of the Key - The semicircle that extends beyond the free-throw line.





There Will Be Blood. Despite being the two lowest grossing films of the five, they are considered to be the best movies released in 2007.




#### Juno

**HT**: Where can we find some of your work?


