Preuss School UCSD Grade Investigation

The Preuss School UCSD has recently been involved a controversial grade investigation. The results of the audit were released, showing that 427 grades were changed without proper documentation.

Students were given weighted grades without actually taking advanced placement or honors courses. The suspicion that lead to the investigation arose from teachers changing grades on the transcripts without having proof that the students actually earned the inflated grade.

In order to go to Preuss, the students' parents must not have attended college.

The school is widely acclaimed as one of the most prestigious schools in the nation. In 2007, Preuss was ranked as one of Newsweek's top ten charter schools of America and was named a California Distinguished School.

The principal, Doris Alvarez, was asked to leave due to the investigation, along with her son-in-law, Preuss's senior advisor, Phil Ensberg.

The administration says this is the standard protocol and they have not formally been linked

An investigation of this magnitude, in relation to grades is not very common in the San Diego Unified School

La Jolla High enforces meticulous procedures when changing a student's grade due to clerical errors or the like.

"This appears to be set of unfortunate circumstances. Here we have very strict guidelines in order to prevent this type of thing from happening," Principal Shelburne said.

Preuss students are outraged by the investigation. A large majority of the students believes the claims are false.

"Ever since our school was recognized for all its great accomplishments, many have had this impression that there is this insidious scandal behind our success. But truthfully, we students at Preuss set high goals for ourselves and earn our grades by studying and

completing our work to the best of our ability," one Preuss student said in an interview for signonsandiego.com.

Other Preuss supporters believe the investigation was sparked by something other than grade discrepancies: racism.

"There are people who believe low-income students, and especially students of color, cannot achieve at the highest level. I think that is thinly veiled racism. When something like the Preuss School becomes successful, they try to chip away at the success," Preuss board member Bud Mehan said in an interview for the



Union Tribune.

Preuss seniors are very concerned about how this will effect their college applications.

The grades that were



recorded incorrectly back to the were reverted grade, appropriate thus lowering many of the students' overall GPA.

In 5.3 percent of the cases, the students did not qualify for the UC minimum grade requirement, which they would have otherwise qualified for.

A new system is being intorduced to prevent this from occurring in the future.

Only two administrators will have the authority to change grades after they have been entered, and all teachers must have the semester grades cosigned by the administration before submitting them.

This new system will give students the accurate, legitimate grade they deserve.

Fire Chief Tracy Jarman has asked the San Diego City Council if the county can Firefighters and firefighting purchase a second firefighting helicopter and asked that it be ready to fly in August of 2008.

Because the helicopter is needed for safety reasons, Mayor Jerry Sanders has agreed to Jarman's request.

The council will contribute about one million dollars to help pay for this second helicopter, but almost all the remaining finances needed will be received by corporate donations.

Firefighters have also become more vocal about the tools they need to decrease the amount of homes and lives in danger during wildfires.

There have been requests for at least twenty new fire stations in San Diego County. The council says that it would cost ten million dollars to build one station and two million dollars annually for upkeep.

The National Fire Protection Association has recommended a minimum of one station for every nine miles.

Because firefighters were sadly under-equipped for the October 2007 fires, they are doing their best to make sure it does not happen again. Jeff

Bowman, former San Diego fire chief, said that he highly recommends and urges the county to obtain at least 50 new

fire engines.

With these new changes to the county's fire stations and equipment, our firefighters will feel prepared for the next firestorm.



According to a poll recently done by CNN, seventy two percent of white Americans feel that America is ready for a black President. "It is the 21st century," senior Micheal Gartmen said. "Do people seriously think we are not ready for a black president?"






