
"We are doing this to make meaningful high school memories," founder Mike Altschuler said.

However, the crimes they committed did not start with the young college students.

About 30 minutes before the students were raped, the defendants and several other young men robbed three men near Belmont Park.

As a result of this heinous crime, local politicians are now stepping up security levels.

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


"This is great that society is finally realizing that we need to have safer things for our environment. Peopleshould also learn to recycle their clothes," senior Allegra Mautner said.





It is not often that a piece of art completely envelops its viewer in absolute emotion.

However, Erwin Redl's new exhibition "Matrix II" at the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art reasserts single work's ability to absolutely captivate the viewer.

Erwin Redl's recently nstalled exhibit is a large room filled with tiny green, phosphor LED lights. The lights are arranged amongst the room in a fairly geometric fashion. The strings of lights are suspended from the ceiling, positioned in a horizontal and vertical perspective. The room s dark, which accentuates each light's effect. The exhibit's physical appearance is incredibly intriguing, due to it's intricate layout. Yet, the work's originality lies within the pieces over all design.

Indeed, the most absorbing acet of Redl's piece is the ability to walk through the room and chains of lights. Given this ability, the works ambiguity becomes increasingly more explicit. Walking down the long rows evokes a similar emotion to walking down an endless, vacant hallway. As one stops at a point and peers through the norizontal axis of the exhibit, the positions of the lights become very planar. Each of these self-induced perceptions makes the reoccurring pattern of lights infinitely interpretable.

Erwin Redl's "Matrix II" a good example of an between use of two and threedimensional pieces. Redl's exhibit is a clear product of the technological age. The lights and their meticulous organization influence imagery of the inter-workings of a computer's circui board. The piece is also very mathematically constructed hence the piece's name

Full room exhibitions are always absorbing, with Redl's exhibition being no exemption from this concept. Redl follows an ephemeral trend of creating a full room piece of art. The works of Annette Messajer Celeste Boursier Mougenot and Jean Pierre Gauthier are prime examples of this newly established movement. Each of these artists' pieces has distinct quality with a similar effect. These works encapsulate viewer, seemingly placing the viewer briefly in the mind of the creator Traditional mediums of ar do not always convey the same emotion, especially for the unimaginative. Therefore, this new wave of work provides the missing dimension to establish the viewer's response. Redl's exhibition will last through May 4. Also, the MOCA offers free admission for those under the age of 25, encouraging more of the youth to interes themselves in the
