
The hall was decked out in beautiful decorations with all the students styled in their best dresses and tuxedos.

### Signed, Sealed, Delivered But is it really for us? An analysis of the CA budget

It has recently been announced that Governor Schwarzenegger will cut funding for California's public schools, which serve 5.9 million students, by a total of \$5.2 billion, a reduction of about \$875 per student. According to the newly released California State Bud-K-12 apportionments of the than in any other district in the state of California.

To make budget matters even more dire, in late January the Board of Education directed an immediate freeze on hiring and spending, suggesting the district staff "think differently and spend less as they

consider expenditures going forward" (Masias, SDUSD Memorandum). They called every school within the district to have spending control limits because of the state deficit. Spending control will apply to capital facilities funds and all kinds of personnel and nonpersonnel expenditures; with the exception of Proposition S's completion, district cenget, the state of California will trally -funded extended day reduce \$85.6 million from the reading programs, special education substitutes PARA pro-San Diego Unified School fessionals, medical supplies, District - more money from us materials for construction and school lunch programs, oil and fuel and maintenance parts for

> Procurement processes on formal written requests for needed materials, procurement cards (to obtain specified things), and payroll will be subject to approval. All of

these will require forms and large amounts of paper work which many people see it as an obstacle and more work.

In relation to the hiring freeze, it was dictated that there would be no new positions available and all vacancies will be frozen. Only positions in direct support of schools in critical job categories could be filled after intense review and approval. Such positions will include teachers, school bus drivers, food service positions, school-sworn police officers, dispatchers or community service officers. Out-of-district travel, conferences, and professional development will be kept at a minimum.

Contracts that are critical and do not exceed the budget will go through additional review and approval as well. Overtime will be limited in critical areas only and would need pre-approval.

Many parents, students and teachers have become increasingly frightened by the staggering amounts of laid off teachers and the amount of money that will be taken away from the schools. Members of the California Teachers Association (CTA) respondedby advertising their up-coming special event called Pink Friday on March 13th, the deadline for California school districts to distribute pink slips, or RIFs, to thousands of teachers. Last year 10,000 teachers got pink slips and 5,000 of them lost their jobs. Now, many teachers predict that the numbers could become even larger.

California legislators say that they are doing everything they can to keep the cuts "out of the classrooms" and provide

the students the education they deserve under the circumstances. "We are trying to keep all of these problems away from the students, but unfortunately these budget cuts will definitely make an impact on them next year," said Principal Dana Shelburne. "Last year, we managed to raise enough money to 'save our teachers' but I don't think that is going to happen again."

He also said that students and teachers would have to adjust to upcoming changes, such as more students in each classroom, less teachers and less resources and materials.

It is clear that between this failing economy and California's budget crisis, the schools of the San Diego Unified School District will struggle to thrive under enormous pressure.

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# The Ethics of Octuplets

Everyone has heard the story of the little old lady who lived in a shoe. She had so many children that she did not know what to do. One thing that the little lady in question did know was that she most certainly should not go for another round of multiple births.

Although the thought of a "human litter" may give rise to some snickers from condescending observers, the fact remains that there are fertility doctors who are willing to implant a virtually obscene number of embryos into their IVF patient, while conveniently ignoring the facts in front of

"To say that someone should not be allowed to have children may seem extremely cruel for the parents. However, if that person is, and will remain, unable to provide for their children, then it is equally as cruel for the children," an anonymous student said.

First of all, it is well documented in the medical world that having more than one child at a time is a potential detriment to both the children and the mother. Second-

ly, the "human litter" is not a natural phenomenon, but a scientific experimentation brought about by doctors and patients whowish to outdo

nature. Therefore, the question remains, why would Nadya Suleman's IVF doctor deliberately implant multiple em-

bryos when there was a huge chance that each and every one would survive? It is not ethical for one woman to give birth to eight children at a time, and certainly not when she has six other children under the age of eight years old.

"When a mother, or any par-

ent for that matter, is unable to take on the financial respoinsiblity of a child, it is just careless to allow that person to care for more than one child," junior Sherry Guo said. "There is no denying that Suleman is trying to be a good parent, but she does not have any means or qualifications to be re-

sponsible for fourteen children, eight of which have health complications and extreme medical needs."

Also, it is a simple medical fact that the more babies that the mother is carrying, the lower the birth weight of the children. This fact gives rise to another question: why would any ethical IVF doctor implant multiple

embryos when the chance of survival would place each child among those with the medical condition of ELBW (extreme low birth rate)?

"Clearly Nadya Suleman's IVF doctor was more concerned with improving his image in the entertainment in-

dustry, rather than in the medical field," Guo said. "Why else would he have allowed one woman to have, at the end of the day, fourteen children when she obviously has no means of caring for them?"

Foolishly, Suleman's doctor chose to overlook both the medical and ethical risks of implanting these embryos and it has resulted in the scientific experiment of keeping eight innocent children alive as a result of an attempt to cheat nature. The moral of the story: If someone with a number of children under the age of 10 decides to deliver another "human litter," then they are seriously lacking both moral integrity and ethical judgement. Women such as Nadya Suleman should not be allowed to carry multiple children, especially when the said women are unable to take on the financial and moral responsibility of caring for these innocent babies whose chance at normal lives have been jeopardized by their mother's irresponsibility.






