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Earthquake Shortens Day

A 7.2 magnitude earthquake in Mexicali on April 4 was the most recent in a string of many

earthquakes in 2010. The quake could be felt in San Diego and generated several aftershocks.

Our recent brush with disaster may give us a new appreciation for the significance of recent quakes around the world.

The devastating earthquake in Chile on February 27 not only had a profound impact on the people and country of Chile, but also on the entire planet. Scientists from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), confirm that the earthquake shifted the earth's axis and shortened the length of a day.

Earthquakes involve the shifting of hundreds of kilometers of rock by several meters, changing the distribution of mass

on the planet. This shifting affects the earth's rotation. As a result of this latest earthquake, the earth moved about eight centimeters or approximately three inches, and the length of the day was essentially shortened by 1.26 microseconds (millionths of a second).

"These natural disasters are inevitable. My heart goes out to the earthquake survivors and their families. 

Most have heard about the racial tension UCSD has been experiencing due to the recent "ghetto-themed" party. During February (Black History Month), an offensive party was thrown off-campus by UCSD students to mock the month's true importance.

The so-called "Compton Cookout" event urged all participants to wear chains, inexpensive clothing, and to speak flamboyantly, the San Diego Union-Tribune reported. Female participants were expected to be "ghetto chicks." Jessica Lunsford was abducted, raped, and murdered by a 47-year old man in 2005. There are different versions of Jessica's Law; in California convicted sex offenders are prohibited to live within 2,000

Thursday, February 25th was a sorrowful day when one of these tragedies took place in our local community. This was the day high school student Chelsea King was raped and murdered while running in a community park. John Albert Gardner III, a formerly convicted offender, was the man who committed this crime. After molesting a 13-year old

girl in 2000, Gardner served only a five year jail sentence, even when his psychiatrist prescribed no known treatment for him.

"There is no known treatment for an individual that sexually assaults girls and does not admit to it in any way," psychiatrist Dr. Matthew Carroll wrote.

With the current sex offender policies, the government itself is responsible for these murders. How many of these tragic crimes will it take before the laws to change? The answer is that too many have already taken place. Even individuals who escape murder and survive these horrid crimes are hurt for life.

"Many people do not realize the emotional imprint these criminals leave on their victims. Such heinous crimes and criminals must be stopped by enforcing stricter laws," senior Lilly Sedaghat said.

So how many more lives will be taken because of the government's absurd laws? While second chances can be a good thing, they should not be given to any individual convicted of sexual offense.





The arrival of spring 2010 signifies the appearance of United States Census questionnaires in the mailboxes of all 300 million U.S. residents. Introduced in the Constitution, the census is a survey that asks ten questions revolving around the number of people living in each household. The questions also ask for the race and gender of each listed individual. Censuses were due on April 1, 2010, also known as National Census Day.

Those who did not mail their forms back will be visited by official census takers from April to July; the employees will record answers to questions at the door. The census is required to take place every ten years, and has been has since 1790. This year, the forms will be distributed among homes from mid-March to April, and all residents will obligated by law to fill out the questions.

The answers citizens and noncitizens give will determine the number of seats a state occupies United States

in the House of Representatives. Their answers also determine how nearly \$400 billion in federal aid will be divided to fund a variety of services including hospitals, schools, emergency, public-works projects, and senior centers. For these reasons, it is imperative that U.S. residents return the ten question document to the United States Census Bureau with the provided postage-paid envelope.

"The census is a really important part of our country, especially now. [It is] exciting that this is happening again after ten years," sophomore Vivian Thai said.

Information collected through the census is also important in providing statistics that can

be beneficial to communities. The data is vital to the process of changing electoral district boundaries as based on changing populations. Census data can also be used to petition for environmental legislation and make positive changes to the way of living for a community. An instance of this occurred in Phillips, a Minnesota town, when they petitioned for further examination of a proposed energy facility. The town used census results to prove that it had a higher number of elderly inhabitants and children under five that may be harmed as a result of the proposed facility.

The census will also provide important information about the changing population in the United States. Current census projections predict that by 2050, minority groups will become the majority in the country. Since 2008, minorities have constituted nearly half the children in the U.S., and that trend continues to rise. Such data could impact the country's legislation on health care, education and immigration in the future.

"It's important because it's the only way that the U.S. government can...get their demographic statistics right... but the government is using a lot of money to reach out to those who don't speak English and that's costing money," sophomore Yuhao Wang

This year, the United States Census Bureau has invested

greatly in a media campaign to remind citizens of the census' impact and encourage U.S. residents to participate. Based on results from the 2000 census, the Bureau concluded that paid advertisements were essential in boosting mail-in responses by the public.

Every one percent increase in mail responses saves about \$85 million. The campaign consists of several television commercials with a distinct jingle and slogan, "We can't move forward until you mail it back." The census has even partnered with Nickelodeon's Dora the Explorer to remind the public that "Children count too." Additionally, The Bureau has launched a road tour, which travels around the country to promote the cen-

The United States Census only occurs once a decade yet it has remained an important government tool in gathering information about the country's population. As one census commercial reminded, ten questions in ten minutes will impact the next ten years.

Extreme Makeover: U.S. Education

In 2002 President Bush's administration passed the No Child Left Behind Act, which required each state to set their own educational goals. Now Obama hopes to replace this program with a new program called the Common Core State Standards. With the creation of the program, he hopes to develop a common goal and level of achievement so that students are prepared for college and the work force. With the exception of Alaska and Texas, 48 governors have agreed to replace their state standards with these new goals.

"I disagree with this plan because it will only lead to the lowering of our standards. La Jolla High School sets its own curricof success that other schools and school districts should emulate. La Jolla High School should not be forced to conform to these new standards," music teacher Mr. Foster said.

During the creation of these new plans, the National Governors Association and the Council of Chief State school officers worked with teachers, experts, and different school administrations to create standards for each grade level. The public can voice their opinion on these standards by commenting on this document.

"I think the Common Core State Standards will be able to give students equal opportunity throughout different school districts; however, it will take

some time before all schools can implement this into their own school districts," junior Zoe Wescoe said.

These goals will give states clear guidelines so that students will be able to reach these goals. Increasing the required standards for each grade level, will allow students to compete on an international level after they have graduated from college.

Obama has agreed to give states four billion dollars if they agree to participate in his new plan to reform the education in United States. In the plan, students will be required to reach certain benchmarks in their grade levels involving language, math, and history.

"We want to challenge all the stakeholders -- parents, teachers, unions, school administrators -to not only raise standards, but ulum to an extent and is a model also make changes required to meet those standards. This can be achieved by having the best teachers and principals, making sure that there's a focus on lowperforming schools, and ensuring that an American student can compete at the international level," President Obama said.
