
Winter Sports Preview



Roger Li, the secretary of Interact Club, has teamed up with the International Rescue Committee to help the refugee population living in City Heights. Refugees in the area come from all over the world such as Asia, South America, Africa, and the Middle East and are relocated to the

United States through refugee resettlement offices. The International Rescue Committee, or IRC, works in 42 countries to relocate refugees, provide emergency relief, and help the refugees rebuild their lives from the disasters they have lived through.

"I am helping out this charity because I care about these people. I work at the students plus program for the IRC where I meet refugee families every day. Seeing these people puts into perspective for me the resilience of human nature. Despite having been through so much, these people still find the strength to forge a new life in such a strange, new place," junior Roger Li said.

Every year, the IRC has an annual toiletries drive where schools in San Diego to purchase certain toiletries, which will be included in care packages in time for the holidays. This year La Jolla High School's Interact Club was as-

> signed to collect soap bars and worked hard to raise money for the purchase of the soap bars. Their goal was to collect 1,300 bars by December 14th.

"When these refugees first enter America, they essentially have nothing. Usually, they do not understand English and the means by which they survived in their native country are rendered useless. The International Rescue Committee seeks to help these refugees adjust to their new lives through events like its annual toiletries drive," junior Roger Li said.


